No explanation was given and Mr. French went back to Honolulu.

#89 A Russian Artist in Hawaii

Abstract: Historical account which focuses on the time (1816-1819) Russian Louis (Ludwig) Choris spent as an artist aboard the Russian vessel Rurick, while it visited the Hawaiian islands. Choris subsequently published a collection of 134 lithographs, 24 of which were based on his time here. The lithographs are considered outstanding, and from the time of the writing of this paper have been an important part of the collection of the Honolulu Academy of Arts. Artist Chovis is internationally renowned for his portraits of Kamehameha, executed ca. 1819. Two versions exist, one based on a sketch commonly felt Chovis executed the ship as he first encountered Kamehameha. It is a simple regal offering with Kamehameha garbed in traditional attire. The second and perhaps more popular "re-vested" portrait depicts Kamehameha in the mismatched attire of a European. This portrait has been much copied, in oils which the artist himself did not work in. The paper also offers historical background into the complicated triangular relationship between the Russians, in particular Dr. Scheffer, King Kaumualii of Kauai and King Kamehameha. **Note, the Chovis lithographs are still a valuable part of the Honolulu Academy of Arts Collection. Abstract: A story of how Eric Knudsen's father, Valdemar, began a cattle and goat ranch called Waiawa. Braided into this story is the history behind the beginnings of the beautiful wild cattle that freely roamed the mountains on the West side of Kauai between the 1860's and 1918. This thread of the story ends at that time, as the area the wild cattle roamed was turned into a forest reserve in 1918 and the death of all loose cattle decreed.
